# Biomedical Research course offered

Biomedical research is essential to the understanding of health and human disease and the advancement of medical technology. For many students, the world of scientific research can feel intimidating and overwhelming, particularly for those in rural areas who may be unsure of how to get started or what the research process involves. Introducing students to research through a hands-on approach early in their academic career helps to inspire students to pursue degrees in science and ease the nerves of those already interested.

Mrs. Lucy McKone is a Biomedical Research instructor at Southwest, who has fostered enthusiasm for science and research at the high school and college level. Her journey into this field began in an unexpected way. She was a sophomore at Copiah Lincoln Community College majoring in education,

with the hopes of becoming a his-

tory teacher, when she was approached by an instructor about a scholarship opportunity for science majors. McKone loved and excelled in her science and math courses, but she always felt underqualified to pursue science any further. However, the scholarship presented her with an opportunity that she could not pass up, leading her into a science education degree focused on biology, with a minor in chemistry. After graduating from the University of southern Mississippi, she taught at Parklane academy for two years before spending twenty-eight years as a high school teacher at Lincoln County schools. As she progressed in her

career, she continued to improve her teaching methods through workshop in Mississippi and Louisiana. Ten years before her retirement, McKone was tackling the complex topic of electrolysis when she realized that she had never performed these experiments herself. Determined to improve her and her student's understandings of such subjects, she sought after professional more prestigious professional development opportunities.

development opportunities. At age forty, she attended her first Ivy League workshop at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York. The following summer she expanded her knowledge at Harvard University located in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and participated in a workshop at Princeton University settled in New Jersey. At these workshops, she met active researchers and had the opportunity to hear multiple Nobel Prize winners speak, further fueling her excitement and knowledge of research. She also went on to earn her master's degree during this time.

In 2011, she became part of a grant, funded by Princeton, that shipped laboratory equipment to teachers so they could introduce their students to research methods. The grant was intended for a five-year period, and although it was not renewed, she was able to continue utilizing the equipment

to further expand knowledge

within her community. She organized and led weekend workshops for local teachers, each lasting ten hours—five hours one Saturday and the other five the following weekend.

following weekend.

After retiring from full time teaching, she began teaching part time at Co-Lin, where her husband Dr. McKone was the Physics instructor. Dr. McKone moved to Southwest to teach Physics in the fall of 2023. He mentioned the Biomedical research program his wife led at Co-Lin, which sparked the interests of many students. As a result, she moved to Southwest where she started offering the Biomedical Research course.

She believes that it is important for underclassmen to be informed and involved with research because of the rapid development of the world through technology. Healthcare is becoming more personalized due to the developments in DNA research and genetics. The courses, BIO1712A and BIO1722A, are offered at Southwest the spring semester.



In order to effectively communicate emergency information to SMCC employees and students, SMCC has implemented a rapid alert and notification system developed by SchoolCast. BearAware is a service that allows employees and students of SMCC to receive alerts. news, or other emergency information via text, email, or by phone. Participation in Bear Aware is not mandatory but encouraged. At this time, the only information entered into the SchoolCast database is the student's "smcc.edu" email address.

Please read the following because our procedures for handling Bear Aware have changed. An email has been sent to all current students, faculty, and staff with their login information for Bear Aware. Students, faculty, and staff no longer need to request this information by emailing bearaware@smcc.edu.

Dear Students.

You should have received an email with your Bear Aware Login information on August 2024. An additional email will be sent to your email account at 9:00 AM with your login information. It's basically he same email that was sent on August 2024. If you have already ogged in and set up your account, no additional action is required on your part. We will be sending more of these login information emails on the 20th of each month this semester to encourage participation in he system. Again, if you have already set up your account, no action s required on your part. We do recommend logging in to Bear Aware at least once a month and verifying the accuracy of your information. Please read the login information email in its entirety. It will explain why your password may be represented by asterisks (\*) and what to do if you cannot log in or if you forgot your password.

If you have any questions, send them to bearaware@smcc.edu from your SMCC email account. We cannot communicate about Bear Aware accounts from other personal or business email accounts you may have. You do not have to contact bearaware@smcc.edu for your ogin information unless you don't get a login information email.

ironic that was. Then, the moment finally arrived. The band performed the national anthem before the tipoff at seven. I asked Jeb what it was like to perform in such a big venue, to which he replied, "It was really fun. There were a lot of people in the stadium." This made sense to me because the Grizzlies are good this year, and the Suns have a widespread fan base. After performing the national anthem, the band went up to their nosebleed seats and watched the entire game. Jeb told me that it was a close game and Kevin Durant had a chance to tie the game at the end but missed the shot. The Grizzlies won the game 120-118 cementing their place as a top contender in the Western Conference. After the game, the band loaded back up onto the bus and drove home. Jeb recalled getting home at about three in the morning and staying up until about five. Thankfully, it was spring break, so no harm was done. That concluded the trip. 

Following a weekend off due to a bye in the schedule, the Bears returned to action Tuesday at Gulf Coast and put together arguably their best series of the season thus far, excelling in hitting, pitching and defense in a sweep of the Bulldogs, taking

Game 1 10-5 and Game 2 9-1.

"It was a really good day, we played baseball all day from the first pitch to the last pitch, like we knew we were capable of doing," Southwest head coach Jack Edmonson said. "It was a great day." The Bears (14-23, 5-7 MACCC) struck first in the first inning as Jake Meilstrup led off with a single and scored two at bats later, on a Lane Steinwinder sacrifice fly. # Men's Golf **Battle to Win**






